

## Statement of Position on Animal Care

The National Pedigreed Livestock Council encourages producers to:

- Produce a quality, wholesome, nutritious product
- Provide a high standard of livestock health
- Manage livestock in a humane manner

- Provide feed and water to maintain livestock health and productivity
- Consult with a licensed veterinarian concerning animal health care practices
- Use approved livestock health products according to label directions
- Sustain and conserve natural resources by proper management of land, air, water and wildlife
- Support and maintain rural and family traditions important to our society




## ANOTHER LOOK BACK

## From the NPLC Centennial book:

In 1911, representatives of American livestock registry associations formed the National Society of Live Stock Record Associations for the purpose of sharing information for the creation of livestock improvement systems.

At that time in history:

- William Howard Taft was
  President of the United
  States.
- The United States Supreme Court ordered the breakup of John D. Rockefeller's Standard Oil Company.
- The Chevrolet Motor Car Company was founded by William Duran.
- Proctor and Gamble of Cincinnati introduced "Crisco" vegetable oil.



- Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics won the Major League Baseball World Series, defeating John McGraw's New York Giants 4 games to 2.
- The first Indianapo lis 500-mile auto race was held on May 30.
- Americans were listening to the hit song "Alexander's Ragtime Band" on the Victrola.

And across the landscape, men and women were poised on the beginning of an era when livestock registry would assist the American livestock breeder in creating a climate where breed improvement would benefit an entire society. The National Pedigreed Livestock Council and its predecessors would play a central role in that transformation.
